Comprehensive Score for Financial Toxicity (COST) measures economic burden among patients with cancer<sup>1</sup>

0 - 44 scale, lower scores indicate worse financial toxicity



What level of financial toxicity correlates with meaningful cost-coping behaviors?



Analyzed survey data of patients with gynecologic cancer from Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center (MA) and the University of Alabama at Birmingham (AL) Financial toxicity (FT) affects nearly half of patients with gynecologic cancer and is associated with cost-coping strategies







Economic cost-coping strategies (changing spending habits, borrowing money)

Behavioral cost-coping strategies (medication non-compliance)
